BIBLE

David Becomes King: I Samuel 16:1-13; II Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10; (2 Corinthians 12:9-10)

LARGE GROUP TIME

WHAT?

MUSIC | "One of a Kind"



- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Play the song, "[One of a Kind](#)," by Vineyard Kids and lead the kids in a dance party!
- Let's see those one-of-a-kind dance moves!! While we're dancing, let's listen to the words of this song and think about how they make us feel!

ACTIVITY | Unusual Charades



- **Does anyone know what "unusual" means?** That's right! Unusual means something that you might not really expect, something uncommon or unique! Let's play some charades in a very unusual way!
- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Create two buckets of index cards, one containing different animals and one containing actions. Split the kids into two teams, and let two kids come up to the front at a time from each team. One kid draws from the

animal bucket and the other from the action bucket. Have them each act out their cards for the group and their team has to guess what animal is doing what action by looking at their two actors (for example, person 1 might act out "shark," while person 2 is acting out "brushing teeth," so the answer is: "a shark brushing its teeth!").

QUESTION | Unlikely Choice?



- **Have you ever felt not good enough?**
- Maybe your mom thought you couldn't pour that juice without spilling it and you proved her wrong!
- Maybe you didn't get picked for a sports team because someone didn't think you were big enough to play!
- Sometimes, people around us or even those closest to us may not think we're the likely choice to do something, but that doesn't mean we can't do it! Let's go to the Bible and hear a story about a boy who knew exactly what it felt like to have people think he wasn't good enough.

SO WHAT?

SCRIPTURE | I Samuel 16:1-13; II Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10



- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *As you tell the story, ask for seven volunteers to be David's brothers, and a leader or another kid to be David. Include girls as volunteers, too! Create a sign that says "Nope!" on one side and "Yup!" on the other. Set aside a crown you will use at the end.*
- Samuel was sent on a secret mission by God to find the next king of Israel. The reason it was so hush-hush is that Israel already had a king. Talk about awkward, right? And he was a good-looking king, too, at least on the outside. But not so much on the inside.
 - At first, the king was pretty successful. The key to his success was that he listened to God!
 - But as time went on, the king thought he knew more than God. Do we

think this made God happy? No way!

- So, God gave Samuel strict instructions to meet with a man named Jesse so that he could anoint one of his sons as king.
 - As soon as Samuel saw Jesse's first son (*Pull a kid from the group and invite kids to applaud.*), Samuel was sure that God had picked him to be king. He looked great!
 - But God said . . . (*Hold up sign*) "Nope!" **Let's see exactly what God said in I Samuel 16:7.**
 - So Samuel moved on to the next brother. He looked like he would make a great king, too! **But what do you think God said?** (*Hold up sign.*) Nope!
 - (*With each new kid, make a big fuss over how perfect they are, then read I Samuel 16:7 again.*)
- Samuel was thinking, "Oh, come on! This is driving me bananas! God said there would be a son, but none of these are the right one! There has to be one more!"
 - But guess what? Outside of Jesse's house the whole time, there was one son who Jesse hadn't even brought in (*Pull up the adult volunteer*). Jesse didn't think of David first. It would have been unusual to choose him in his mind. But God saw something different in David and Samuel did, too! But when Samuel met him, God said, "Yup!" Finally!
 - And Samuel declared him king by pouring oil on his head. It was a mark of kindness and a symbol of honor, a tradition practiced in ancient Greece, Egypt, Rome, and in the Hebrew Scripture. It is often called, "anointing."
 - We won't "anoint" our friend, "David," here, but we will let them wear this crown! (*Put crown on "David."*)
- From that point on, God was with David, the new king. David reigned for a very long time, and he was the greatest king Israel ever had!

THE BIG IDEA | God uses unlikely people. ▲



- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *Reveal a character who will be making appearances all month: Brick (can be any gender). Brick wears a muscle suit, flexes constantly, carries a huge, fake weight, kisses fake giant muscles, and takes every possible opportunity to brag about how awesome and brilliant and great they*

are. Of course, even though Brick seems to be a likely hero. Brick is actually not that tough after all and will be outwitted each week by a kid who reveals the Big Idea. Read the following script:

- **Brick:** Hey, there, pipsqueaks. I'm Brick. I just got back from the gym. I was the strongest person there. And the smartest. And the best-looking. Obviously. I mean, look at me. I'm basically a born hero.
 - **Leader:** Hey, Brick, we're really glad to have you here, but we're all special people in this room. We all have different gifts that God has given us.
 - **Brick:** Yeah, sure, whatever, but I bring the most special stuff. I mean, look at me. I am an extremely likely hero. Speaking of which, does anyone need any rescuing?
 - **Leader:** Well, we don't need rescuing, but if you'd really like, you can reveal this week's Big Idea. It's in this jar. *(Give Brick a empty jar with a relatively loose lid.)*
 - **Brick:** Oh, ha! Easy peasy. *(Really ham it up trying to get the lid off the jar.)* Did you. . . is this a trick? Oof! Ugh! Erf! Did you glue it down? My hands must be slippery!
 - **Leader:** Would anyone else like to try? *(Make sure to select a reader from among the volunteers.)*
 - **Brick:** Oh, sure. Like this little kid can do it if I can't. Go ahead and try, kid. *(Kid will open jar easily.)* What?! How did you – I mean, you're welcome! You know, since I, uh, loosened it up for you and – oh! I think I hear someone in need of rescue! Gotta go! *(Runs off stage.)*
 - **Leader:** Well, that sure was interesting, wasn't it? Hey, buddy, you might not be quite as muscle-y as our friend, Brick, but it turns out, you opened that jar just fine! I think you should read us this week's Big Idea!
- This week's Big Idea is **God uses unlikely people!**

QUESTION | What is an underdog? ▲



- **Who knows what an underdog is?**
- An underdog is a character in a story or a situation who you don't expect to win. Underdogs are all around us. We see them in our favorite movies and television shows. We hear about them in sporting events. It's always the team or person that has little to no chance of beating the other one.
- Sometimes, we might even feel like underdogs. But that's great news because God often uses the underdog!
- David was seen as a true underdog in the eyes of his family, but he was the one who God chose to be king because of his heart. As we stay close to God, God will use us to do great things, too! **God uses unlikely people.**

SCRIPTURE | II Corinthians 12:9-10



- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *Read II Corinthians 12:9-10. Then either show on a screen or print out a large [picture of a leafcutter ant](#).*
- Does everyone see this little guy up here? We all know what that is, right? Yep, it's an ant!
 - This kind of ant is called a leafcutter ant, and it might not look all that special, but guess what? It's one of the strongest animals on the whole planet.
 - A leafcutter ant can lift twenty times its body weight! That's like a first grader picking up an entire piano by themselves! The point is, it's really, really strong, even though it might seem unlikely.
- The Bible passage we just read says that when we are weak, then we are strong. That makes no sense! Or does it?
 - When David was chosen to be king, it was God that made David strong enough to do the task that others thought he could not do. And God is with us, too.
 - Aren't you glad that no matter what other people think of us, God knows that we can do big things? I sure am.
- And if that little, bitty leafcutter ant can pick up twenty times its weight, there are endless possibilities for what God can do through unlikely people like you and me!

- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Watch this [video](#). Discuss with the kids what made Billy the unlikely winner of his Olympic race.
- **What challenges did Billy face that made him and people around him think that he maybe shouldn't be running the race or that he wouldn't win?**
- **What do we think it was that made it possible for Billy to win at the end?**
 - He had a lot of heart, didn't he?
- **What does God teach us about people like Billy?**

REFLECTION | Based on Looks ▲



- **INSTRUCTIONS:** Divide the kids into smaller discussion groups, ideally with one leader per group, though the kids can self direct their discussions with roaming leaders helping to prompt them, if necessary. Begin the conversation by sharing a story of your own of a time that you felt judged prematurely, and then encourage the kids to share with their groups times they felt similarly, maybe having been judged on their outward appearance or their age or gender or ability.

- It really seems like most of us have had the experience of being judged unfairly based on what people think they can tell about us from the outside.
- We all make mistakes and judge other people unfairly. Even Samuel did that, and he was one of God's special messengers! But remember what God said to Samuel when he did that? God looks at people's hearts!
- No one knows what's in people's hearts . . . only God can. No matter what any of us look like on the outside, what matters to God is what's on the inside. That's how **God uses unlikely people** to do great things!

MEMORY VERSE | Erase the Verse ▲



- **INSTRUCTIONS:** *This can be done on a dry erase board or a digital screen. Tell the kids to read the verse. Then, erase the last word of the memory verse and repeat. Continue this until the verse is completely gone and the kids have successfully recited the memory verse from memory.*

PRAYER ▲



- Dear God, thank you for making us all unique! You have placed something special in each and every one of us. Forgive us for not seeing that in one another as we should. Help us to love our friends the way you love them and not judge those around us based on their outward appearance. We know you can do amazing things in unlikely ways. Amen.

- **Why did Samuel immediately assume that Jesse's oldest son was the**

- What did God tell Samuel about all of Jesse's sons?
- Why did Jesse not call David into the house in the beginning?
- Read II Corinthians 12:9-10. This verse says that we should be okay with our weaknesses. Why do you think that is?
- What does it mean when we say God uses unlikely people?
- What are some things we can do to see people for their hearts the way God does?
- How can we have the kind of heart God looks for?
